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Boat Ramp Rules

The two boat ramps in Gulf Harbors are owned by the Gulf Harbors Civic Association and maintained for the benefit of our membership.

The <u>North Channel Ramp</u>, off Bowline Bend, has a steep incline and is suitable for all size boats. Recommended use at High Tide.

The South Channel Ramp near the intersection of Floramar Terrace and Topsail Trail can always be used, but it is **better suited for use at Mid to High Tide**.

To schedule a ramp opening, contact one of the following Official Key Holders. They are volunteers. Please give them a minimum of 1 HOUR notice. You can call, or text them for easier contact.

PLEASE NOTE: The best time to launch boats from the South Channel boat ramp is between HALF and HIGH TIDE.

The following regulations apply to all ramp users:

- Use is Restricted to Daylight hours only.
- A current GHCA membership card must be presented to gain access along with boat registration in the cardholder's name and current driver's license. Must be 21 years of age or older.

NO EXCEPTIONS!!

- Non-members will be charged \$100.00 (in advance) for each opening of the ramp.
- 4. Do not use your engines to load or unload boats.
- Bring your own helpers. It is not the responsibility of the key holders to assist you in launching or retrieving your boat.
- If you intend to use the boat ramp frequently, a key may be leased from the GHCA Office for your personal use. Keys are \$40.00 plus a \$10.00 security deposit (GHCA members only). Please inquire at the GHCA Office for the requirements to lease a key.

The leased key is only to be used by the authorized GHCA member.

- Ramp locks are changed January 5th of each year.
- Please report any misuse of the boat ramps to the GHCA Office or the Boat Ramp Supervisor, Frank Rose at 401-447-0996.

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From the desk of the President

Here we are, the beginning of the summer months. Many have already left for the summers up north, others have perhaps started their summer vacations, but others stay here in our beautiful community to enjoy the Florida Summer. Whichever you are, Happy Summer.

At our last General Membership meeting we had a lively discussion about the insurances for the Civic Center. It was voted on and unanimously approved to renew the insurance this year to include General Liability and property insurance without Wind and Hurricane. Our Membership also voted to start adding each year to our Fund, which up to now was a self-insured Flood account. We have voted to rename the account the GHCA Hazard Fund and will be depositing a flat amount each year, starting this year with \$8,500, bringing our total in that account, to well over \$110,000 and with interest it will close the year with over \$115,000.

Our renovations to inner office and refreshing of the Annex room should be complete by now, take a trip down to the Civic Center to see the much-needed updates.

We will be sending out emails and perhaps even surveys over the summer, as we don't hold General Membership meetings over the summer to try to keep everyone informed as to our Comings and Goings from now till September. In the meanwhile, please remain confident that your GHCA Board and Office staff is always striving to make our community the bet it can be.

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
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From the Desk of Public Relations

Last month I pointed out that house numbers are required to be installed, and the guidelines are detailed there, including the reference to section 901.9. Please be aware that the county has been specifically enforcing that code, so consider this a heads up to have your house number properly displayed, even if you have not already received a reminder letter from the Deed Restriction Committee.

As the summer approaches, please keep in mind that county code prohibits the habitual storage of RVs and trailers in front of your house, including on the driveway. Our deed restrictions also prohibit storing them on the side of the house in most areas, but these specific details vary within Gulf Harbors. If you want to see what specific deed restrictions apply to your home, you can find that on the Gulf Harbors website at gulfharbors.com, under the

GHCA tab, click on Deed Restrictions and follow the directions. Or you can wait until you get a notice from the Deed Restriction Committee, at which time the clock starts ticking. Please don't fall into the mindset that if you see a neighbor with a boat in their driveway, that you think it is okay for you to do it too. That neighbor may have already been sent a notice, or they may have already been visited by Code Enforcement. Don't follow a bad example, you do you.

Remember that these codes and deed restrictions are there to protect the character of the entire community. Most of us are boaters, and even so I receive complaints about trailers and RVs from other boaters. So be considerate of your neighbors and help preserve the premiere character of Gulf Harbors.

Grouper with Saute Cherry Tomatoes in Cream Sauce

Yay!!!!! Grouper season is here.....

- 1 pound grouper or Cod cut in 4 serving sizes
- 1 teaspoon sea salt
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes cut in half
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1 large garlic clove chopped fine
- 2 tablespoons dry white wine
- 1 tablespoon fat free half & half
- 3 basil leaves chopped fine



Season fish on both sides with sea salt. In a frying pan on medium high heat add 1 tablespoon of each oil & butter. When oil is nice and hot and butter melted add fish let it cook approximately 5minutes or until fish turns white around the edge then turn fish and cook additional 3 minutes until it just starts to want to flake when you touch it with a fork.

In a separate frying pan on medium high heat add 1 teaspoon oil, chopped garlic and tomatoes and sauté 2 to 3 minutes add wine cook additional minute add butter basil and half & half and heat through until butter has fully melted and incorporated with cream.

Plate fish and top with tomato cream sauce. Serve immediately.

The Boater's Corner By Captains Bruce and Wendy Longman

It's easy to keep your outboard in tip-top shape, even if you're not a mechanic. Preventive boat motor maintenance facilitates safe boating and can keep your motor reliable for a long time.

After Every Trip

- Flush out the engine. This doesn't just apply to saltwater adventures, but to freshwater outings as well.
- Start up the engine and let the water pump do the rest (practice safe boating by remembering to stay clear of the prop and make sure no one tries to shift the motor into gear).
- While you're flushing the motor, check the water pump to make sure it has good water
 flow. Carefully put your finger through the stream of water. It may be warm, but it
 shouldn't be hot. If the output is not strong, you may have some debris stuck in the
 outflow tube. Immediately shut down the engine to prevent overheating and damage.
 Insert a small piece of wire into the flow tube and work it back and forth. Start the engine
 again and check the output. If that doesn't solve the problem, you may need a new water
 pump.
- After flushing the engine, disconnect the fuel line and allow the engine to burn all the fuel in the carburetor.
- Once you've finished the flushing and run the engine out of fuel, be sure to turn off the key and, if you have a battery switch, turn it off.
- Take the engine cowling off and check for fuel or water leaks
- Wipe everything down and spray with an anti-corrosive like WD 40 or Quick-lube. Be sure to lubricate all the moving parts, such as the shift, throttle cables, carburetor valves, etc.
- Replace the cowling and wipe it down. Keep a canvas or plastic cover on the engine between trips.
- Always use fresh fuel. We recommend ethanol free gas. If the boat has sat for a long time drain and replace the fuel.

Regular Maintenance

- Periodically check the fuel line for cracks and worn spots.
- Make sure the fuel primer bulb is not cracked and is pliable.
- Make sure the fuel-line fittings seat properly and don't leak.
- Check the clamps on the fuel line for rust or corrosion.
- Check the tank vent to make sure it aspirates properly.
- Check regularly for water in the fuel. Installing a fuel water separator is HIGHLY recommended

The Boater's Corner By Captains Bruce and Wendy Longman

Many phrases that have been adopted into everyday use originate from seafaring – in particular from the days of sail. Virtually all of these are metaphorical and the original nautical meanings are now forgotten. We thought you might find the origins of these sayings quite interesting.

above board - Anything on or above the open deck. If something is open and in plain view, it is above board.

aloof - Now means to stand apart or be indifferent, but it came from the Old Dutch word loef which meant "windward" and was used to describe a ship within a fleet which sailed higher to the wind and was thus drawn apart from the rest of the fleet.

chock-a-block - Meaning something is filled to capacity or over loaded. If two blocks of rigging tackle were so hard together they couldn't be tightened further, it was said they were Chock-a-Block. This lead to its current meaning, "crammed so tightly together as to prevent movement".

clean bill of health - A certificate signed by a port authority attesting that no contagious disease existed in the port of departure and none of crew were infected with a disease at the time of sailing. Shore-side, it means in good shape.

cut and run - If a smaller ship at anchor was discovered by a larger enemy vessel, the smaller ship might decide that discretion is the better part of valor, and so would order the crew to cut the anchor cable and sail off in a hurry.

fits the bill - A Bill of Lading was signed by the ship's master acknowledging receipt of specified goods and the promise to deliver them to their destination in the same condition. Upon delivery, the goods were checked against the bill to see if all was in order. If so, they fit the bill.

footloose - The bottom portion of a sail is called the foot. If it is not secured, it is footloose and it dances randomly in the wind.

flying colors - To come through a battle with flying colors means a ship has come through relatively unscathed and with her colors (flag) flying.

groggy - In 1740, British Admiral Vernon (whose nickname was "Old Grogram" for the cloak of grogram which he wore) ordered that the sailors' daily ration of rum be diluted with water. The men called the mixture "grog". A sailor who drank too much grog was "groggy".

know the ropes - There are miles rope in the rigging of a square rigged ship. The only way of keeping track of the function of all of these lines was to memorize (know) where they were located. It took an experienced seaman to know the ropes.

loose cannon - A cannon having come loose on the deck of a pitching, rolling, and yawing deck could cause severe injury and damage. Has come to mean an unpredictable or uncontrolled person who is likely to cause unintentional damage.

no room to swing a cat - The entire ship's company was required to witness flogging at close hand. If the ship was crowded the Boatswain might not have enough room to swing his cat o' nine tails. So this does not refer to a real cat!

pipe down - A boatswain's call denoting the completion of an all hands evolution, and that you can go below. It was the last signal from the Bosun's pipe each day which meant "lights out" and "silence".

scuttlebutt - A butt was a barrel. Scuttle meant to chop a hole in something. The scuttlebutt was a water barrel with a hole cut into it so that sailors could reach in and dip out drinking water. The scuttlebutt was the place where the ship's gossip was exchanged. slush fund - A slushy slurry of fat was obtained by boiling or scraping the empty salted meat storage barrels. This stuff called "slush" was often sold ashore by the ship's cook for the benefit of himself or the crew. The money so derived became known as a slush fund. 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



Hello Gulf Harbors! The market continues to be strong this, inventory has dropped from 28 single family homes on January 2nd to just 16 homes Active on the market today (May 8th). Pending sales are up from 3 (!) to 14 Sales Pending today; and 32 homes have closed YTD (16 Gulf Harbors homes sold and closed in April – that's a WOW)! The average price per square foot is up this month from \$361 in 2022 to \$400 today, but the average price of homes sold dropped considerably. That's because more homes at lower price points are selling, only 2 homes over a Million \$\$ have sold YTD 2023. Check out the statistics below for more "scoop" on what's happening in our local real estate market.

In other big news, the City of New Port Richey ran an article in their newsletter last month about the new development going on at the Magnuson property. Reprinted here in case you missed it – very interesting stuff. The face of our neighborhood is about the change – big time. Will it be wonderful or is it something to fear? Time will tell; but in our humble opinion, we believe the new condo/hotel will ultimately positively impact our property values.

Aqua Harbor Project Developer - Simone Development & Management, Inc.

"This proposed development involves the demolition of the Magnuson Hotel. In its place, two separate buildings containing a total of 96 condominium units and an additional building for a 92-room hotel will be constructed. The site is approximately 3.67 acres on the southwest side of US Highway 19 and Marine Parkway. The planned amenities for the condominium complex include outdoor activity areas (bocce, dog park, pickleball, pool and patio area), exterior site lighting and benches along a walkway adjacent to the existing canal and docks. Planned hotel amenities include an elevated deck area and a meeting/event space. At this time, it is projected that the demolition of the existing hotel will commence in May 2023. The condominium units will be constructed first, and they will be built one building at a time. The projected taxable value of the condominiums is \$25.4 million with the completion of both buildings. The 92-unit hotel has a projected taxable value of \$6.1 million."
